Modesto Library celebrates one day in the year to put books into children's home libraries: "forever" books, theirs to keep. "Día" is that day. It will be April 29 this year at the Modesto Library (Check the library calendar for Dia events in other branches).

Friends of the Modesto Library supports this program with over 600 new books to make sure more kids benefit.



If you want to celebrate "Día" and help kids "eat up" books, you can "eat up" at Panda Express on Friday, April 28 when the library's collaborator, Imagination Library of

Stanislaus County, and Panda Express are holding a one-day fundraiser. Online orders only at www.pandaexpress.com or via the Panda Express App. Apply code 913152 in the "Fundraiser Code" box during checkout, and 28 percent goes to books for children. You can order up to a week ahead of time for pickup or delivery on April 28 or order the same day.

In 2004, the Stanislaus Library Foundation began recognizing individuals, businesses and Friends of the Library members for their support of the library. The Shining Star Award honors people throughout Stanislaus County for their commitment and work with the county libraries.

This year, Friends of the Modesto Library has selected Linda Owen as our nominee. Linda avoids the spotlight and quietly provides services to the library and a literacy program. She is involved in getting printed copies of our newsletter to members and various locations. She is a member of the Dewey Crew, which weekly works in the children's library making sure books are in their right place and neatly shelved, and she volunteers for most Friends' events, including book sales and children's programs. This retired teacher also serves as a KidsQuest tutor, bringing her lifelong love of learning and reading to students.

Linda dreamed of becoming a librarian or a teacher. She has always loved the library, so when she retired from teaching it was a natural move to Friends of the Modesto Library.

Her favorite part of volunteering is seeing kids enjoying books. When she isn't volunteering at the library, Linda enjoys reading historical fiction or mysteries.

Two Non-profits With Distinct Priorities

Q. Both the Friends of the Modesto Library (FOML) and the Stanislaus Library Foundation seem to focus on libraries. How do they differ?

A. FOML is a non-profit organization established in 1974 to raise funds and friends for the Modesto Library. Money raised through events, donations and memberships annually provides for numerous things that are not a part of the Modesto Library budget. Recently FOML funds have been used to purchase shelving and furniture for the children's area, children's books to hand out free at library events, the Juvenile Justice Center book club and programming for children and adults. Our members volunteer at special events and some help weekly to make sure the children's books are in their proper places.

The Stanislaus Library Foundation, also a non-profit, was organized in 1994 to raise funds for all 13 libraries within the Stanislaus library system. The Foundation supports programs such as the summer readings programs at all 13 libraries, Book Club in a Box and 1000 Books Before Kindergarten.

Getting Books To All Children From Day 1

Beginning in June, the State Library will provide 50 percent of the funding so that every young child in California can receive books through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. The other half will need to be covered through grants and donations.

Currently, there is no local government support. More than 2,000 children living in Stanislaus County are currently enrolled in this program, which costs about \$30 per child. Children can be enrolled at birth and receive a book per month to age 5.

At story hours, the Modesto Library will encourage parents and caregivers to sign up their children for Imagination Library. Friends of the Modesto Library is providing volunteers to help with enrollments. FOML also donates money to this effort.
