### Let's get more books in hands of more children

The tax provides 90% of the funding for our 13 county libraries, including the Modesto Library. # **Stanislaus READS!**

Stanislaus READS! is a multi-agency initiative to help bring children up to grade level in reading by third grade. This is the last year that reading is taught as a subject and a student's concentration shifts to reading to learn.

With 61% of Stanislaus students not reading at grade level by the end of third grade, this goal is a worthy one. Studies show that students who fail to meet this critical milestone are at a higher risk for dropping out of high school, teenage pregnancy and incarceration.

Stanislaus Community Foundation, Stanislaus County of Education, Head Start, Children and Families Commission and the Stanislaus County Library are leading this exciting effort. Mobilizing parents, childcare providers, educators, practitioners and business leaders is ongoing.

Three challenges are being targeted by these agencies: school readiness, chronic absences and summer slide. There is optimism that a significant impact can be made. Our library can help. Here's how:

• Friends volunteer to read and enjoy books with children over the summer

• Continue motivational programs to inspire children to spend time with books, already up and running at the Stanislaus Library

• Workshops for parents to help them employ good reading practices with their children

• Create donation opportunities. Start a Stanislaus READS! box at the library where children's literature can be donated and put into a child's hands.

• Discover more about the Imagination Library, founded by Dolly Parton, where a book is mailed to a child's home every month for their first five years.

This program costs just \$30 a year per child and is currently being done in Turlock with plans to target five pilot school communities in Modesto next year.

Connection is the key to this initiative. Keep posted!

### **1,000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN:** Ongoing program for parents and children

A new free reading program for infants, toddlers, and preschool-aged children encourages parents to read 1,000 books with their child before he or she starts kindergarten. This is a goal that experts say children need to help them learn to read for themselves.

The program works like this: • Parents and children read books together.

• They color in a seed on

a recording sheet for each book read. Books may be read more than once. Credit is received for each reading. Books read to a child during Story Time, at day care, by grandparents or even siblings count, too.

• When the child has finished a recording sheet of 100 seeds he or she brings the log to the library and receives a special sticker and the next 100 book reading log.



read, the child will receive a special prize and a wonderful head start toward school.

The program has no ending date except when the child enters kindergarten. If you read three books a day every day, you will have 1,000 books in one year!

• In the United States 58% of adults have a library cards. BUT, in Stanislaus County 74% of residents are library card holders.

• A recent poll found that 94% of respondents agreed that

public libraries play an important role in giving everyone a chance to succeed, because libraries provide free access to resources.

• There are more public libraries than McDonald's in the US.

• Public access computers in Stanislaus County libraries were used 201,792 times last year.

If you haven't recently checked the Stanislaus County website — <u>www.</u> <u>stanislauslibrary.org</u> — you might have missed some of the great opportunities available.

One of the newest is in partnership with Driving Tests.org.

For the newest driver getting ready for the first driving license or for anyone who is in need of retaking the written test, the stress of studying and learning about all the changes in the laws can be daunting. Now there is help. The library provides 24/7 online access to the California Driver Manuals for vehicle, motorcycle, and commercial driving. It also provides practice tests.

When you go onto the site you will see the start button shown above.

Once you click on the start now box, you will have the option of having the information read aloud, save them as MP3s, translate into other languages, or even magnify the text.

What another great resource our library is offering the community. Try it out — especially those practice tests.

## FROM THE LIBRARIAN

At the March General Membership meeting for Friends of the Modesto Library, County Librarian Diane McDonnell was the featured speaker. Her message about the state of the Stanislaus County Library system and our Modesto Library was a very positive one. Some of the highlights of her message included:



• More than 823,000 physical items were checked out of the Modesto Library last year.

• 20,000 children, teens, and families attended programs sponsored by the library.

• More than 16,000 library cards were issued at the Modesto Library last year.

• Modesto Library received a grant from the California State Library to assist the staff with grant writing and small projects being developed by the staff.

• A new enclosed space for quiet reading or laptop work is being built near the southwest corner of the library.

• The Modesto Library will receive funding as part of the "Veterans Connect @the

Library" project to develop a veteran's resource area.

• A grant to provide children's services outreach through Story Time, issuing library cards, and checking out materials in conjunction with WIC, a federally-funded health and nutrition program for women, infants, and children.

• In the 2016-17 year the circulation desk will be moved away from the entrance so that circulation and reference services will be more centralized.

• Passport service at the Modesto Library processed 4,551 passport applications last year generating more than \$100,000 in revenue for the library.

• The library is looking at revising the Rules for Behavior to allow covered beverages in the library as do so many libraries throughout the country.

• The library is looking at banning smoking from the Portico area and library grounds throughout library county system.

The news is fantastic; the future is bright! We have a strong base on which to grow.

## Traveling just got easier with passport service

In need of a passport book or passport card so you can travel this summer or fall?

No need to go to the post office or court reporters' office any longer. You can now complete your passport process at the Reference Desk in the Modesto Library. The staff is there to help you with the process and make sure everything is ready for you. What makes this service an even greater deal is that the passport process can be completed Monday through Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. or on Saturday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

These hours are friendlier to those still

working or in school.

There are a few things you'll need to bring to the reference desk: a 2x2 passport photo, evidence of US Citizenship such as your birth certificate, an acceptable identification card with your photo and birth date on it, a check or money order (adults: book \$110 or card \$30 and child under 16: book \$80 or card \$15), and finally a separate check, money order, or cash payable to Modesto Library for \$25.

These fees are the same at the post office or clerk reporters' office.

This is a great community service provided to Stanislaus County residents.

## Common cry heard at annual used book sale

Hundreds of readers converged on the east portico for the sixth annual Friends of the Modesto Library Used Book sale.

There was something for every reader, with categories ranging from memoir to self help, military to spiritual, young adult to cooking.

One little boy approached a worker with \$1 in his hand and asked if that was enough to buy a book. He was thrilled as she led him to the kids section, and proudly came back to pay for his two prized choices. A woman was excited to add six J.D. Robb (pen name of Nora Roberts) titles to fill out her collection. Many shoppers mentioned that they wait every year for the first Saturday in May and the FOML book sale.

The sale is possible thanks to the hard work of many volunteers who sort the books, move them from the Beard Land Improvement Co. warehouse to the library, set up tables and staff the pay stations. Many thanks to them and to the generous folks at Beard, with a special shoutout to Theresa Cooper, the Beard liaison who is so helpful for months before the sale.
