All of the money raised at the Used Book Sale goes toward library projects serving children and adults.

Also, the campaign to Save Stanislaus Libraries has just begun. This pertains to the 1/8th of one percent sales tax renewal in 2017. This sales tax funds 88 percent of the Stanislaus County Library (all thirteen branches) budget. The public library is vital to this community. AWE Early Literacy Stations, designed specifically for children ages 2-8, are now available at all Stanislaus County Libraries.

The colorful keyboards and interactive learning software provide a fun and safe learning experience. AWE computers are not connected to the Internet, yet they offer 70 software titles and more than 4,000 learning activities. These fun, interactive and engaging computers include content that spans all seven curricular areas: math, science and nature, social studies and geography, reading, art and music, writing and computer skills, and reference.

The Modesto Library has four AWE computers available in the Children's Room. Future plans include the addition of Spanish bilingual AWE computers. The cost



of these premium Early Literacy Stations is approximately \$3,000 each. Those who wish to contribute to the cost of expanding this valuable service are invited to make donations through the Friends of the Modesto Library.

Here is a quick guide to some of the Library's newer digital offerings:

Learn a language with Mango

From Arabic to Italian to Norwegian to Yiddish, and yes, even English, Mango Languages makes learning a language fun. The webbased interactive program features a simple, step-by-step interface to help you learn practical conversation skills for more than 60 different languages. No downloads or technical expertise is necessary. Simply create a Mango account and you're on your way to parlez-vous Francais!

Browse a magazine

Zinio is an online magazine collection that the library subscribes to for the reading and browsing enjoyment of our customers. Currently the library offers 51 magazines—from Architectural



Digest to Women's Health—that can be read on computers and mobile devices. You can check out as many magazines as you like and keep them as long as you wish. You never need

to return checked out magazines, and they do not expire. Just create a Library Collection account on the website <u>www.rbdigital.com/</u> <u>stanislausca/service/zinio/landing?)</u> and you'll be on your way!

The Library offers Hoopla Digital, a new, refreshingly quick way to get audiobooks, comics, eBooks, movies, music, and television shows. All Hoopla content is available on demand. No holds necessary and there is no waiting.

Users can access their selections via online streaming. Audiobooks may be temporarily downloaded to a mobile device for listening without an internet connection.

You can check out up to six items a month.

The Stanislaus County Library offers access to thousands of eBooks through the 3M Cloud Library. Enjoy downloads immediately with mobile devices or tablets supporting the iOS or Android operating systems or transfer from a PC to a compatible device! You can enjoy eBooks at home or on the go. Browse, check out, read, and transfer eBooks to your eReader with the 3M Cloud Library PC Application and Mac Application.

Oh, what a DDDD Celebrating children and books

hildren and books collided for a smash-up celebration on Saturday, April 2, at the Modesto Library. For the tenth anniversary of El día de los niños/ El día de los libros, Day of the Child/ Day of the Book at Modesto, close to 700 people came to view performers, make crafts, play games, and — most exciting of all — leave with a brand new book in the hand of every child who attended.

In addition to the 600-plus new children's books donated by the Friends of the Modesto Library [FOML], every child left with an activity book donated by Stanislaus READS! and a specially printed Día booklet. The booklets, printed by Dittos, made their way into the homes of our community's families with hints to encourage reading at home. Stanislaus County Library is partnering with Stanislaus READS! to address the low literacy rate in the county. Día is one effort toward this and FOML is delighted to be part of it. — Anne Britton

Imagination Library

On March 21, Stanislaus READS! presented a progress report to the community. Reports were given on the implementation of exciting programs related to School Readiness, Attendance and Summer Learning. The goal is to double the number of



students in participating pilot schools reading proficiently by the end of third grade by 2020.

One of the programs under the umbrella of School Readiness is Imagination Library, which sends free books, mailed monthly, directly to the homes of children from birth to age 5 who live in the zip code of the pilot schools. To date, 452 children have been enrolled at Burbank, Moon School in Waterford, Chrysler, Sylvan and Las Palmas in Patterson.

The Stanislaus Community Foundation has raised \$60,000 in donations from involved community groups and individuals, enough to sponsor 850 children. Champions are active on these campuses raising awareness and signing up new members daily. Workshops are being planned for the parents of these children to share best practices in reading, discussing and sharing books. The Imagination Library is lucky to pair with the library on this endeavor. Thank you Olga Cardenas!

We look forward to adding to our growing list and seeing the difference it makes to the success of Stanislaus READS! and the youngest community of learners it serves.

Stanislaus READS! Update

To date the Stanislaus County Library system has received more than 3,500 new children's books from Stanislaus READS! thanks to the Stanislaus Community Foundation and Stanislaus County Office of Education. About 2,000 books were distributed to children throughout the county at library Día events. Another 1,500, which youth outreach services librarian Olga Cardenas calls "marvelous tools" for parents who attend early literacy workshops and other events, will be sent home for use putting new skills into practice in our community's families. — Anne Britton

What changed? You used to carry a S.H.A.R.E.S. card and show it to the cashier when you checked out. This guaranteed the Friends received a donation every time you shopped. Now you don't have to carry a card, but

How much do the Friends make? Each enrolled shopper earns up to 3 percent for Friends of the Modesto Library on qualifying purchases when they check out with their registered phone or card number. For our organization that has meant about \$1,200 per year for over five years.

A dozen Friends who received an email about the change in Save Mart's fundraising program in March have signed up with eScrip, and a few others had previously signed up. That's a start, but if we can get a large group of participants, we can earn a lot more than we have been. Raley's or O'Brien's also will donate a percentage of your purchases when you shop there.




