Early on I learned about the Zoom app, which is free if you only want to video conference with a few people for less than 40 minutes. So I first tried using Zoom to read to the grandchildren by holding up a book before my laptop camera here in Modesto and then angling it so I could read the words to the kids – ages 5 and 2. It was a bit awkward but better than nothing. I could see their faces and hear their voices.

Then it occurred to me that I could download books from the Cloud Library or Hoopla and use Zoom's share screen function so that the kids were seeing the same pages – pictures and words – that I was seeing on my screen. I could read to

them or they could read to me -- or describe the pictures at least.

All it took was my library card and a little time to get comfortable with the digital check out procedures and the share screen option.

I also appreciate the Online Resource list that the librarians put together. It includes some interesting web sites for us to check out and to suggest for the grandkids.

Even though the doors of the Modesto Library have been closed since mid-March, it is still providing wonderful services to county residents. Thank you.

## **Online sale benefits FOML and LearningQuest**





# Library Staff Busy During Pandemic, Preparing for Library Reopening

County Librarian Sarah Dentan reports that library staff have been very active in spite of the libraries being closed due to the pandemic:

- Virtual programming, including story times, performers, online trivia contests, virtual escape rooms and book discussions have stretched creativity to new lengths.
- Grab & Go STEM kits and Summer Reading Challenge are keeping kids engaged, reading and learning.
- Digital services, including the new Digital Library Card, are bringing people back to the library: fully one third of the new digital cards have been issued to

people who have held library cards in the past but have not stepped foot into a library in years.

- More than 11,000 books and library materials have been checked out each month through online reserve system.
- Some staffers have been put to work at the County OES office, Salida testing center and other sites to help during the pandemic.
- Meanwhile, plans are in place for a twophase reopening, once conditions permit.
  Phase 1 calls for modified hours, social distancing, reduced building capacity, face coverings and regular sanitation. In Phase 2, Saturday and evening hours will resume.

# KidsQuest tutoring resumes

A bright spot this summer was the resumption – at least temporarily – of KidsQuest tutoring at the Modesto Library. "Thanks to eight KidsQuest volunteers who together dedicated 80 hours of time, we were able to serve a dozen students this July," said KidsQuest Program Coordinator Catherine Ferrell. The Library allowed KidsQuest to utilize space on the south portico and all necessary safety precautions were taken.

# FOML board approves 2020-21 funding requests

Despite the pandemic, in June, the FOML board approved \$16,500 in funding requests for the Modesto Library. Included in Library Manager Chris Moreno's wish list were new furniture, fixtures and display cabinets for the children's library, funds for children and adult programs, books and materials for the Juvenile Justice Center Book Club, and County Fair book giveaways.
