Secrets of the Library Resealed

Spotlight on the Reference Desk

The Modesto Library's Reference Desk is a busy place: last year it logged approximately 129,300 customer contacts. Reference Librarian John McCloud says that while the Circulation and Children's departments also get questions, the Reference Desk has the greatest variety of customers and inquiries.

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McCloud, who has been with the Stanislaus County Library since 1999, says there are nine Reference employees at the Modesto library. Local branch libraries also take reference calls. Most of the time, two employees are on the desk and one is behind the scenes answering the phone. Reference staffers make sure to embrace the library's five "Ps" for customer service: Be prompt, positive, perceptive, personal and prepared.

What do Reference Desk employees do? Customers might have a passport application appointment, need help on the computers uploading a completed job application to a prospective employer's web site, want printouts or newspapers, or need help to navigate the library catalog and then find a book on the shelf. A library can be confusing for someone who doesn't use it frequently.

Reference employees can also provide information such as dates and times of city council meetings, and field questions from the commonplace to the unusual, including how do I get my GED, what do I need to do when I move, and what's the schedule of the US Open Tennis tournament. The Reference Desk is also the place for you if you need help installing library apps on your tablet or phone or want to sign up for computer classes.

Reference books are still available for research, although the library also has 24 databases online, including AtoZ The USA, AtoZ World Culture, Fine Arts & Music Collection, Career Transitions, and America's News. If you visit the library, many reference books are available in eBook format, a plus since they can be accessed remotely or through the computers at all 13 county libraries.

In 2012 the Library began offering passport services. Walk-ins were accepted at first, but due to its popularity the service is now available by appointment only.

Reference Librarian Vicki Salinas coordinates adult programs for the Modesto Library with the assistance of other Reference staff. Between July 2016 and April 2017, the Modesto Library conducted 63 adult programs with 1,779 attendees. Reference is also responsible for book displays, handouts for services and information from various agencies including bus schedules, DMV handbooks and community education, VetConnect, Citizenship Corner, computer classes and ensuring that government meeting agendas are available to the public.

Reference staff members also order books for the library system. For instance, McCloud orders adult science fiction, fantasy, horror and graphic novels in addition to reference books.—Maree Hawkins

displaying lawn signs, and in general demonstrating our fervent support for the library and the renewal of the dedicated 1/8cent sales tax that supports the 13-branch system.



Stanislaus County Voters Say "YES!" to "S"

It was a long haul, but worth every bit of the effort. Measure S, which was originally to have gone before voters in June, instead appeared on the November ballot. The response was an emphatic "YES!" to libraries, with more than 80% voting in favor of extending the 1/8-cent sales tax that provides almost 90% of library funding. Moreover, voters approved the tax for 12 years, which provides a solid foundation for planning for the foreseeable future, when libraries will continue to play a crucial role in the community.

Campaign co-chair Pat Portwood said, "The campaign could not have succeeded without the tireless efforts of hundreds of volunteers and the strong financial support of many more hundreds of contributors, including Friends of the Library organizations."

Keeping our Children Reading

A major endeavor of the Friends of the Modesto Library (FOML) is support for the library's school readiness initiative. Here's why:

"Research shows that children living in low income households are likely to reach their third birthday having been exposed to 30,000,000 fewer words than three-year-olds from more affluent families. 61 percent of children from low income households have **no children's books available in their homes.**"

The Library is a partner with the other organizations in Stanislaus READS! to bring all our communities' children up to reading level by third grade. (The quote above is from their website.*) **Thirty million (!)** is a big deficit. So is 61%. The question to FOML was, "how can we help the library address this and get more book into the hands of more children?" Because books that stay in the home address both deficits, this is our answer:

- Hold Scholastic Book Fairs at the library as a source of high-quality, low-cost books for children and teens in the community and as a fundraiser.
- Provide "Wish Lists" for local youthserving agencies at the book fair to provide a way for the community to donate books to the cause through these agencies.
- Distribute the books FOML earns through the book fairs to those agencies and later in April to children at the Modesto Library's annual Día De Los



Niños/Libros, Day of the Child/Day of the Book event.

Families involved with agencies like Children's Crisis Center, LearningQuest, Haven Women's Center, Hutton House, Parent Resource Center, Red Shield Center, and Redwood Family Center can then enjoy books to keep. And in April every child who attends Día at the Modesto Library leaves with a book in hand for sharing at home.

Last year over 300 children received books in April. Thank you to all the donors and shoppers last year who made this possible. We hope you will make it possible to do even more through your shopping or donations at the Scholastic Book Fair on November 8, 9 and 11 in the Modesto Library Auditorium. (Closed Friday, November 10 for Veterans Day.)

Imagination Library

We are in our third year of implementing Imagination Library in Stanislaus County. Children, from birth to age 5, receive a book a month in the mail. The younger siblings of a student enrolled at one of eight pilot schools are also eligible. Singer Dolly Parton began the program in Tennessee in 1995, and it has grown throughout the world with over 70 million books in the hands of young children. The cost is \$25 a year per child. Those lucky newborns are signed up at birth, and will begin Kindergarten with a personal library of 60 books!

We are now in the process of measuring the impact these books are having on Kindergarten Readiness. Stanislaus Reads! the umbrella for the Imagination Library, is focused on bringing kids up to grade level in reading by 3rd grade. Readiness testing, given to entering Kindergartners, will be analyzed to see if there is a measureable difference in the results of those receiving the Imagination Library books.

Not all benefits can be measured by testing. A survey was sent to Imagination Library families, with encouraging results. Children value their IL books, and many responded that the IL books comprise most of the books in their child's library. Most answered that their child gets read to daily, and the majority of parents said they were reading to their children more often due to receiving the IL books. Aside from parents, older siblings are reading to their younger brothers and sisters, an added bonus.

Some exciting quotes:

"We love receiving new books in the mail and we read them immediately!"

"We read more together, and we describe the picture on each page."

"I used to read once a day, but my child is getting more and more books, so she wants me to read to her more."

"They feel special because they have their name on them and they take care of them like something that belongs to them."

"The program helps motivate us to read to our children. Thank you, thank you very much."

"Thank you for allowing me to get new books to read to my daughter and to give her a love of books."

"Thank you for your generosity.You are helping foster a love for reading!"
